A New Way of Being

Absolutely essential and indispensable to the Christian faith is the belief that God has taken humanity into God's self. Because of this act, this event of mystery, God has made humanity the object of God's grace. This grace is not given in part, it is given in its totality. It is given without condition. This is love reduced to it essence.

This means not only that each and every one of us is the object of God's grace, but that God has taken upon God's self the cause of humanity. Our cause is God's cause. Our human plight is God's plight. It is this taking on of our plight in the incarnation that gives birth to something further—hope. This is not simply hope for the individual, although it is certainly that. It is hope for the created order. God in taking up the plight and cause of humanity takes it all up, again not in part, but in totality. This means that God and who God is—love, eternity, all-powerfulness, justice, mercy, goodness, boundlessness, ever-present, is in the act of incarnation in the service of humanity. God rushes to our side, stands with us against the dark tides, and is forever with us and for us, because humanity now also resides in God in the event of Jesus Christ. Hope in this instance then can never be fully quenched, it cannot be extinguished because God cannot be quenched or extinguished.

Hope so conceived brings into being a peace. This is a peace divinely rooted in humanity. If grace and love with hope in their wake, hope brings with it peace. We seek for peace in a world so torn by violence of word and act, deed and deafness, that at times we can forget that God's hope will not be overcome and that God's peace will prevail because God will not be overcome. God will not be overcome by hopelessness nor will God be thwarted by the dissonance and disharmony, the disgrace and drudgery that humanity seeks to dwell in. Because God indwells humanity dissonance will dissolve into concord, disharmony into melody, drudgery into freedom, and disgrace into honor. God's peace, peace that defies and eludes us, will be ours because God has taken up our plight and our cause.

The incarnation makes a new way where there was no way. It makes hope, love, grace, and peace not only *a* possibility, but *the* only possibility for humanity. Advent marks a time of waiting for and remembering these things. Not things that *might* be but things that *will* be and have already begun because God has made our plight and cause God's own.

May the hope, peace, joy and love of God in Christ be with you all this coming year.

Homeless, prayer projects front, center for 2023

One of the central themes I like to emphasize to any church's missions work is that it is so much more than money. I say that to committee members often.

It is easy to lose sight of that fact when the missions committee is continually bringing to the church's attention missionaries and projects that are in need of our giving to further God's work around the world.

Yeah, we all know, money is needed. We are a giving church, and in addition to our regular support of our two missionaries, we offer special communion offerings each month to give over and above our church tithe to ministries at work in our community and beyond.

It's one thing I love about missions — we reach beyond ourselves with the substance of our lives: our money, our time, and our prayers.

And, you will see me asking for special offerings, like this month's communion offering helping the **homeless in Zagreb**, **Croatia**, through the work of former students of the seminary where Pastor Eric and I taught.

I do hope you will give liberally to this and our future communion offerings.

And beyond that, we engage in missions in other, non-monetary ways. That includes education and, most importantly, prayer.

Again this year, the missions committee will be providing information and materials to emphasize prayer for our community and large groups of people in the world.

We will again participate in the **Seek God for the City** project, which includes 40 days of prayer for our own neighborhoods from Ash Wednesday, Feb. 22, to Palm Sunday, April 2. The daily readings and prayers emphasize "expansive prayers of solid hope" and include ideas of people and place to focus our prayer efforts.

We will also engage in special prayer projects for the Muslim and Buddhist worlds: beginning with **30 Days of Prayer for the Muslim World**, March 19 to April 18, offered during the month of Ramadan, Muslims themselves seek God.

Our Church Bell

The bell was purchased at the time of the building in 1874. A Subscription was circulated by L. Persons and E. D. Staddard. It was drawn up in the usual fashion and was for the purchase of a bell to be placed in the M. E. Church of Pultneyville. The following consideration was included:

to be placed in the M. E. Church of Pultneyville. The following consideration was included:

"The Consideration with the donors of the above mentioned Bell, shall be, that after the application of five (5) of the above donors or of their heirs or assign, to the Presiding Minister, or to one (1) of the Trustees of the Church wherein the Bell is flared, it shall be rung or tolled as requested, but not to the interruption of the regular use for religious services of the M. E. Society of this place. This shall be binding upon our heirs and successors forever."

1922 A gift of \$1000 was given by Fred L. (1844-1938) and Martha Vanderboegh Goevaert (1848-1936) towards the new Church Bell. To the church family they were known as Uncle Fred and Aunt Mart.

Fred and Martha Goevaert lived on the west side of Hamilton Street and maintained a large farm. Hester and Frank Truelson later took possession of that home and Fred's Niece, Hester raised William Manahan her nephew, (son of Ella, Hester's sister) who also attended Pultneyville Reformed Church.)




The McShane Bell Foundry was located in Baltimore, Maryland. Founded in 1856
