Family Promise Update

October's Communion offering will be for Family Promise of Wayne County, a non-denominational organization dedicated to helping children and their families experiencing temporary homelessness. Through a coordinated local network of churches, service organizations, and community resources, FPWC provides temporary short-term housing implemented with intensive case management services to families in an effort to achieve sustainable independence through sustainable housing. During the 2021-2022 school year, an estimated 600 children here in Wayne County were without stable housing. Nearly half of them were not yet school-aged. Family Promise also has a preventive program called ROTH which stands for Roof Over Their Head. This program aims to keep families in their housing and prevent them from becoming homeless. The program assists with one-time rental arrears and utilities, first month's rent, or security deposits.

PRC has been a strong support for Family Promise from the beginning of program operations in 2018. FPWC brought in the first family in late October 2018, almost 5 years ago now. PRC was originally a host congregation and welcomed the program's first family right before Christmas that year. As time went on, we transitioned to a support congregation to East Palmyra Christian Reformed Church, which is also our current role today. We help support with groceries and Monday dinner four times a year in this role.

Family Promise operates an apartment model program post-COVID. Due to financial constraints and the rising costs of utilities among other things, FPWC currently only serves 2 families, one at the Day Resource Center and one in an apartment that FPWC rents. This was the most fiscally responsible decision that had to be made to ensure the future of the program.

While families are in the shelter program, they are provided with housing, utilities, household supplies such as cleaning supplies and paper products, diapers, and other hygiene products. Families work closely with Nancy Ramos, the Care Coordinator, to work toward program goals. Families receive referrals to partnering agencies such as DSS, Catholic Charities, Section 8 housing, food pantries and clothing closets, among many others in order to try and get families to sustainable independence. They are also provided a list of local landlords that have built a relationship with the program to assist in finding housing.

Graduating families are offered a 5 Star Start from donations received by the program. This may include a couch, chair, beds, dishes, microwave, toaster, and like items. Some ROTH families also receive some of these items as well.

This year, 37 families have called Family Promise of Wayne County looking for shelter. Many of those families were able to receive assistance through the ROTH program. Year to date, 6 families with a total of 15 children have graduated into stable housing. The ROTH program has also assisted 38 families with a total of 87 children this year, while over 80 families have applied for rental assistance. The two families currently in the program include a family of 5 with 3 children, and a family of 3 with 1 child.

Family Promise's ongoing needs for donations include paper towels, tissues, diapers in larger sizes, pull-ups, trash bags, gently used furniture and household items, and monetary donations. There is also always a need for a variety of volunteer roles and on the Board of Trustees.

Family Promise is entering a new and exciting phase beginning in October. Our new director, Evonne Pomerantz, will begin her role with the program. Evonne and her family live in Marion and she is very familiar with programs and resources throughout Wayne County. As someone who experienced homelessness in young adulthood, Evonne brings a unique perspective to the role. Also in October, Family Promise of Wayne County will be entering a partnership with the Finger Lakes CAP Program (formerly know as Wayne CAP). This will be mutually beneficial to both parties as each provides services the other does not. This partnership will also save Family Promise some expenses and allows access to experienced grant writers to help grow the program. At this time, Family Promise is looking to become more secure financially and grow back up to serving at least 4 families at a time like it used to. The program is looking to purchase an apartment building or a building that can be changed into small apartments in order to own its own apartments and save on expenses. The program also continues to search for grants to fund the program and look for fundraising events to help cover program costs.

Family Promise of Wayne County is appreciative for, and thanks PRC for your continued support and prayers.

Fall focus centers on Asia; trip ideas for 2024 sought

A couple of fun missions projects are in the works for the fall and both feature places in Asia. Our big event is still in the works, but we are hoping to learn more about our missionaries in Japan through it.

We are planning to join together in 15 Days of Prayer for the Buddhist World in November and have an event set for Sunday, November 12 in which we will again try our hand at making some of the foods from the places we learn about.

We will also focus attention on our missionaries in Japan, **Nathan and Nozomi Brownell**. They work in evangelism and church planting as well as education and leadership development.

They live in Yokohama and offer acceptance, forgiveness, and hope to young people who live with nearly unbearable stress. To reach them, they run the Green House, an after-school program where they can hear testimonies from Christians, a rare thing in this country that is less than 1% Christian. Nathan also teaches at a school founded by the RCA and Nozomi trains volunteers for Children in Worship.

Come to **our next Missions meeting, set for 7 p.m. on Thursday, October 12**, and help us plan this fun event.

We also are looking for ideas for a **future mission trip**, possibly in 2024. We have some seed money from the 2022 Croatia trip and would like to offer something that fits with our congregation's gifts and interests. Please bring your ideas to me or one of the other members of the missions committee.

Part of the seed money comes from a refund we received after many months of waiting. This substantial refund was from the

Dutch airline KLM for cancelling our flights to/from the town of Split, Croatia, near the site of the Oasis Conference we hosted last year. The bulk of the money has been set aside for a future trip, but \$500 was included in our recent gift to Marijana Čizmanski, our July Communion offering recipient.

Marijana runs **Zdrava Zajednica**, a ministry in a small town in Serbia inhabited by Roma, a disadvantaged people group with little support from each other or the government. Thanks to your generosity, we were able to send her \$2,085 to complete her third year of her psychology degree, money to cover six months of past-due salary for her bookkeeper, as well as refund herself for some out-of-pocket car expenses.

She is so thankful! And the money came as she is also dealing with the stress of what may be her mother's last days, as her kidneys have started to fail on top of many other serious issues.

Marijana has had to travel for some required educational events and may put off some of her planned Community Health Evangelism training events due to her mother's condition. Please keep her in prayer as she deals with this heavy personal battle, in the midst of the myriad of ministry stresses she lives with.



She is a former student of Eric's and mine at the Evangelical Theological Seminary in Croatia, and she worked with Carolyn Otterness to develop her ministry model. - 1. The church
- 3. The Dominie's barn

- 2. The Dominie's House
- 4. The Dominie's Toilet
- 5. Open-backed sheds for horses and buggies/cutters.
- 6. Privately owned/rented sheds with doors which closed completely.
- 7. Home of John DuBurck, Sr. 8. The Du Burck's toilet

According to Nellie, there was at that time no toilet in the church. One had to use either the Dominie's or the Du Burck's and the Du Burck's was much nicer.
