PRC team to care for women missionaries in Croatia

Tired and stressed-out American missionaries in Croatia will receive long-lasting tender words and gentle care if we can send a group of PRC women to join them at **Oasis 2022**.

I've been asked to bring a team of 10 women with me to Croatia **Sept. 25 through Oct. 4** for this important annual retreat that functions as a lifeline for full-time mission workers. We also need women (and men!) who will pray for the team and the ladies at the conference, plan surprises for them and give toward this effort.

I know from experience how important this retreat is to the women who serve in Croatia, Bosnia, Hungary and other nearby locations. The bolstering it provided encouraged me so much that I told time by how many months it was until the next conference.

The retreat gave me time to think, laugh, pray, and share stories with sisters who understood the cultural weight of the day-to-day realities of living in the Balkans. I met amazing women of God who had spent years in country, knew the language and encouraged me. By sharing experiences we learned so many simple details of how to manage our lives and families in that very different environment.

The conference is administered by a group of missionaries themselves with a different host church providing support each year. When I was in country, it was just known as Brela, for the town where it was held. The ladies have since changed the name to Oasis to reflect its purpose as well as to account for the change of location. It is still on the coast, but now it is in Trogir. Our team

will arrive a couple of days before the conferees to give us a chance to get over our jet lag and meet the conference committee.

The main task for team members is to **pamper** the women, something so needed for those living in a brusque culture often devoid of beauty. And one thing my experience says about the women here in Pultneyville: they certainly have the gift of making someone feel loved!

The steps involved in me just getting to the conference the first time is a typical Croatian story. Though it had been held for several years, I did not find out about it until my third year in country. A fellow missionary in Osijek invited me to join in 2008. We rode a 5 a.m. train about 60 miles to the south, where we met up with another woman whose husband drove us about 120 miles to the capital of Zagreb, where we connected with yet another woman and her baby. We grabbed lunch at Subway at about 10:30 a.m. Then this woman drove us the rest of the way to the conference, about 280 miles, finally on an interstate-style highway with a one-way toll of about \$30. We arrived at 5 p.m., with barely enough time to join the rest of the participants who were eating dinner. It was quite a trek!

During the conference, I was very excited to have won an auction of a bushel basket filled with candy corn and other fall items, but then remembered that I would have to carry this unwieldy item along with my luggage onto a train!

If you want to be part of this fun event by going or helping in other ways, sign up in Trinity Hall for an informational meeting to be held in early May. More details will be posted on the missions board.




Caring Hands most recent project has been for the Poncho Project for Pluta Cancer
