Lenten House Blessings by Pastor Eric

This practice may be unfamiliar to many of you. It is a practice in many churches (especially Catholic, Orthodox, and Anglican) for the minister to go around to houses during the Lenten season to bless houses and/or busi-



nesses of parishioners. We do this in recognition that God came to dwell with us and to be a blessing in our lives. The places where we dwell are a big part of our lives.

My visit to your house can be as brief as you would like, and I'm not there to take a tour of your home to discover your secrets. I'm simply there to pray for you, your family, and your place of dwelling (or if you prefer business). I usually will anoint the entryway of your home, and you as well. I do this using an anointing brush that I made (a practice among the Orthodox), along with anointing oil which has been deeply prayed over and had the four Gospels read during the three day preparation cycle. The anointing oil comes from the most ancient formula's I could find, again from Orthodox tradition, and did my best to reconstruct.

The visits will begin Saturdays, March 5th, and continue through April 2nd, and will be offered at 10:00, 12:00, and 2:00. If at all possible I would like the visitations to be filled in that order, so that I don't have a gap between the 10:00 and 2:00 visits.

Adult Education

The Spring Education Series will be six sessions beginning this Sunday, March 6th starting around 11:15 (following service). The topic is timely and it focuses in on the activity of the Protestant Church (Reformed and Lutheran) during the Weimar Republic of German (1919-1930), The period prior to the National Socialists seizure of power. I will focus especially on Karl Barth's (1886-1968) early theological responses to this alliance between the Church and a political party. I think you will find it as fascinating, illuminating, and disturbing as I do. So please plan on attending: We will meet in the Fellowship Hall, so we have some room to spread. Perhaps Covid will even give us a break by then. The name of the course will be: *An Unholy Alliance: Lessons the Church Should Learn*.

Lenten Bible Study

We will be having a 6 week Lenten study beginning this Thursday, March 3rd at 9:30, either in the Agape Room or Fellowship Hall, depending on class size. The book we will be using is entitled "Easter Earthquake" by James Harnish. He invites us to explore how Jesus' resurrection shifts our assumptions about ourselves and God. "The earthshaking promise of Easter is that God has not forsaken any of us. The risen Christ will meet us along the confused, chaotic, fearful paths of our lives and speak the same words the women hear at the tomb, 'Do not be afraid." This will be a great time to be together, pray together, study together, share thoughts together and just BE, as we wait for Easter and the celebration of Jesus' resurrection. Pray better together with Seek God guide

Years of Covid got you down? Winter snows and dirty cars and melting slush dragging on you?

Wouldn't you like to see new spiritual life spring from within and flow out toward all you encounter? Wouldn't it be great to see that happen across Pultneyville Reformed Church? How about in Williamson, Wayne County, beyond?

What exactly would it look like if we showed more evidence of the vibrancy of the Holy Spirit in all we do?

That's how we will begin this Lenten prayer session with the *Seek God for the City* guide. The theme for the first 11 days beginning with Ash Wednesday (March 2) is "Seeking Christ's Life to Revive His Church."

Think about that a minute.

Is Christ's life stale? tired? overwhelmed by the challenges of declining — anything?

Jesus promised us that He would build His church, and not even the gates of hell could stop it.

We are His church, so that means we have all the vibrancy and life that He has. Let's stop and drink that in for a hot second.

O Lord, revive me!

We know we have been forgiven. Lent is a 40-day period of time on the church calendar in which we contemplate — slowly — what we've been forgiven of and what it cost.

My progressive pictorial missions bulletin board has been an attempt to convey the heart of Lent and the heart of missions: a separation from God that we could not overcome no matter what and a God of love that breached that separation at great cost.

But how many of our neighbors — near and far — live still in the separation part of that story?

Oh, that they would know how close God wants to be to them! How He longs to bring them into the fold!

Week Two of the *Seek God* guide leads us into prayers for just that: "Seeking Christ's Light to Awaken the Lost."

Week Three brings us to "Seeking Christ's Glory in Evangelizing All Peoples."

Week Four: "Seeking Christ's Righteousness in Our Communities." We could certainly use some of that!

Week Five: "Seeking Christ's Peace Among All Peoples" Yes, Lord! Make it so!

Then all the prayers lead us to a wonderful, Palm Sunday of "Welcoming Christ our King!"

Even before we get to that day, though, the missions committee will roll out the 30 Days of Prayer for the Muslim World — another prayer project with a booklet of prayer prompts. This one coincides with the Muslim month of prayer and fasting known as Ramadan, which this year goes from April 2 to May 1. We'll learn more about that as we get closer. Vast numbers of Muslim-background peoples have come to Christ in the 30-plus years of this project. Many miracles have been recorded.

I don't know about you, but I am excited to see what God will do in me as I begin these two prayer seasons. I encourage you to participate — at whatever level you wish. I can say that both efforts have made a huge impact on my life.

quilters and others. They have not branched off on their own as has happened in a couple of churches I'm told.


